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St Joseph's Catholic church, Jerusalem/Hiruhārama (Photos: CvdK).

Designed by Scottish architect Thomas Turnbull (1824–1907; see *Newsletter* 2015) and built by Messrs Bett & McFadgen, the church opened in 1893 to replace an earlier building that had burnt down. It was here in 1892 that Mother Mary (Meri) Joseph (Suzanne Aubert, 1835–1926) founded the Daughters of Our Lady of Compassion. Located on a bend in the Whanganui river, Hiruhārama is also famous for the commune (1969–72) established by poet James K. Baxter; it remains a place of pilgrimage, with accommodation at the old convent.

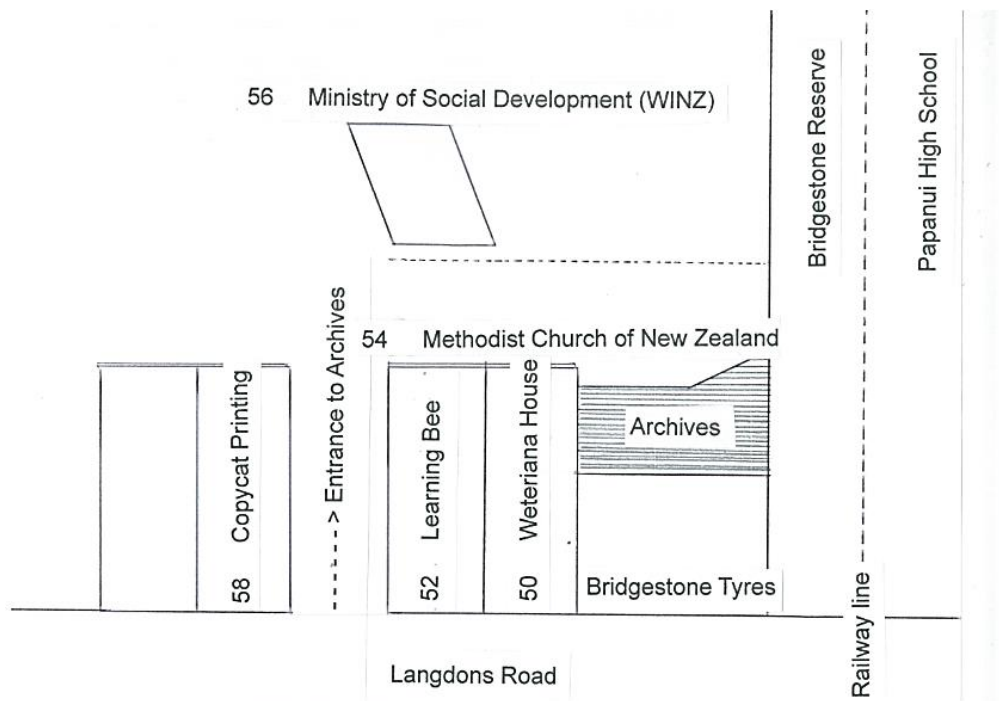

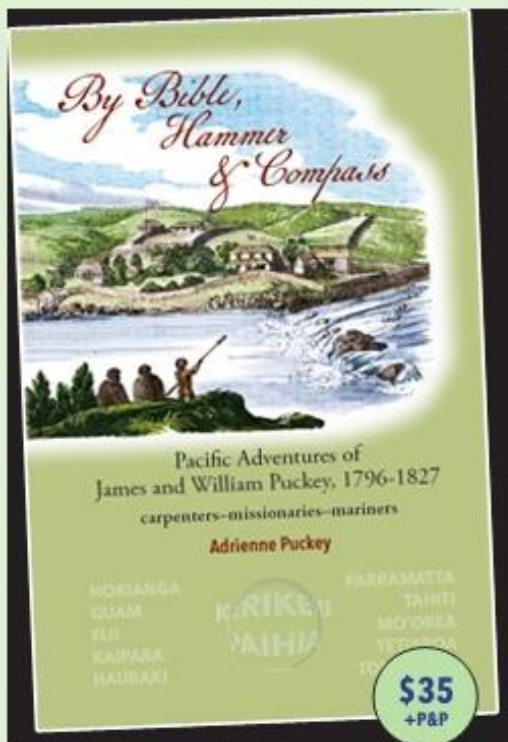
New Recollect website

At the Presbyterian Research Centre in Dunedin we hold the national archives of the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. These include parish records, records of church governance and material from the church's missions both overseas and among Māori.

We recently launched our new Recollect website (<https://pcanzarchives.recollect.co.nz/>), which makes available over 9,000 photographs from our collections, including images from the Māori Missions in Te Urewara and from New Zealand Presbyterian missions in China, India and the New Hebrides (Vanuatu). It also provides access to digitised issues of two early national Presbyterian publications, the New Zealand Presbyterian (1879–1893) and The Outlook (1911–1934).
