Current research and work in progress

Jesse Annabell (History, Massey University), is working on a thesis on Scottishness and Presbyterianism and their tensions.

Michael Blain (11 Carnarvon St, Linwood, Christchurch 8006) is engaged in research on the history of the first forty years of the Anglican diocese of Christchurch and the episcopate of H.W.Harper. In conjunction with this project Bishop Harper's correspondence - recently re-discovered when the Anglican Church office moved sites - is being sorted and catalogued.

Allan Davidson is currently working on an entry on Leonard Isitt for *The Dictionary of New Zealand Biography;* sixteen entries, mainly on New Zealand missionaries, for the *Biographical Dictionary of Christian Missions*, ed. G.H.Anderson and to be published by Simon and Schuster; the biography of Semisi Nau, a Tongan Methodist missionary who worked in the Solomon islands from 1905-20 and pioneered missionary work on Ontong Java.

Mark Gallagher (formerly of the Pacific Theological College) is editing a set of three volumes on Pacific religious history which will include some reference to Maori.

Ruth Hall (History, Massey University), is writing an honours dissertation on the 1984 debate over the ratification of the United Nations Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination against Women.

Sandy Hamilton (Religious Studies, University of Canterbury), is researching religious pluralism in New Zealand from an historical perspective for a BAHons research essay.

Earle Howe (16 Lupton Rd, Manurewa) is engaged in research on the history of the Anglican diocese of Auckland during the 19th century.

Brett Knowles' Ph.D. thesis (Otago), 'Some aspects of the history of the New Life Churches of New Zealand 1960-1990', has been submitted and is currently being examined. Peter Matheson is currently working on research related to Argula von Grumbach; Thomas Muntzer; The Reformation Pamphlet, especially polemic and dialogue; and the history of New Zealand Theology.

Jessie Munro has been awarded a Claude McCarthy Fellowship to enable her to undertake full-time research for a biography of Mother Aubert. She will be based at the Stout Research Centre, Victoria University of Wellington.

Jane Simpson (Religious Studies, University of Canterbury) has begun work on a study of the Student Christian Movement in New Zealand and more specifically on the influence of its members in public life. She is also preparing a paper 'Suffrage:re-examining the religious dimension' for presentation at the August conferences of the

New Zealand Historical Association, and the New Zealand Association for the Study of Religions.

Courses and Conferences

At the College House Institute of Theology several students taking the course on Christianity in New Zealand (CSO1), taught by Michael Blain, are working on research topics related to colonial Canterbury. These include: West Coast clergy and their particular troubles; the Canterbury Association clerical supporters who did not come to Canterbury; J.W.Stack and the Maori mission based on Tuahiwi; rural visitations of Bishop Harper; the chaplains of the Canterbury Association ships; and the life of Herbert East, a Christchurch tradesman turned priest.

The British denominational history societies are holding a conference in Birmingham from July 28-30 1995. Peter Lineham (History, Massey University), has details.

Allan Davidson will be on a year's sabbatical leave from the beginning of July 1994. The first part will be spent in Australia, Solomon islands, Fiji, Tonga, and New Zealand finishing a book on Semisi Nau. (See notes on research in progress.) The first half of 1995 will be spent in the Northern Hemisphere where the major research will focus on Colonial Christianity, particularly the records of the United Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.
