What is FRBR (2)

- Independent of cataloguing codes
- Does not replace MARC or AACR
- Not an application or implementation
- Not metadata



- Entities
- Relationships
- Attributes



Group 1 entities

Products of intellectual or artistic endeavour

Hierarchy of Group 1 entities

- Work a distinctive intellectual or artistic creation
- Expression an intellectual or artistic realisation of work
- Manifestation physical embodiment of the expression of a work
- Item a single copy of a manifestation

Relationships between Group 1 entities

- Work is realised through one or more Expressions
- each of which is embodied in one or more Manifestations
- each of which is exemplified by one or more Items

Group 2 entities

- Those responsible for the intellectual & artistic content
- persons
- corporate bodies

- Entities that serve as subjects of intellectual or artistic endeavour





OCLC Test

- December 2001
- Tested OCLC algorithm against 1,000 works
- Random sample

Results

- 47 million records = 32 million works
- ~1.5 manifestations/work
- 78% have only a single manifestation -Elemental Works
- 16% have only a single expression but multiple manifestations - Simple Works
- 6% have multiple expression Complex Works, e.g. translations, revisions

Results, cont.

- 25,000 works > 20 manifestations
- 415,000 works > 4 manifestations
- 30% records and 50% of holdings are in a cluster

- Over 2.6 million bibliographic records for fiction clustered according to the OCLC FRBR work set algorithm



OCLC - xISBN

- http://www.oclc.org/research/researchworks/xisb n/default.htm
- An experimental web service
- xISBN server receives a single ISBN and returns a list of all ISBNs for the work cluster (in XML or XHTML)

OCLC - xISBN

- Empowers ISBN searches:
 - Quickly check OPAC for all editions/versions during selection/acquisitions/gift book processing
 - ILL requests
 - Find local library's editions when user finds any edition of item on Amazon, etc.

OCLC - Bookmarklets

- Integration of "bookmarklets" technology with xISBN lookup service

OCLC - Bookmarklets

- WorldCat as a source for ISBNs
- FRBR algorithm used to build tables of ISBNs
- FRBR Bookmarklets queries the tables and receives the string of all ISBNs for the work

FRBR impact on cataloguing rules

- JSC for Revision of AACR reviewed a compilation of proposed revisions to incorporate FRBR terminology and concepts
- LC had prepared a proposal on FRBR terms in the Appendices and Glossary (at the April 2004 meeting)

FRBR impact on Bibliographic Structures

- Bibliographic structures could evolve to better meet user needs
- Simplified authority work

FRBR model can be used to

- Cluster bibliographic records retrieved via a search
- Display search results in more meaningful ways
- Assist users in selecting items
