Preface

As a Subject Librarian for the School of Counselling, Human Services and Social Work at the Faculty of Education at the University of Auckland I am often asked to search for literature related to multicultural social work, including professional practice with Asian clients. This bibliography is an attempt to bring together research and literature of interest to social work professionals working with Asian clients in New Zealand.

Scope

I have concentrated on material published in, or about New Zealand but selected international material has also been included where this was considered relevant to the New Zealand situation.

The bibliography includes references to journal articles, conference papers, government reports and selected books.

Information is arranged by selected “fields of practice” subject headings, in the APA style.

No one bibliography is ever likely to be comprehensive. I hope however that the material presented here will be of assistance to social workers’ professional practice as they attempt to increase their knowledge, skills and awareness of issues related to Asian peoples.
